

Keyboard Purchase Advice

There are a huge variety of keyboard options available depending on your available space and budget.

Keyboards

For a complete beginner on a budget, a keyboard is a good initial instrument choice and will last your child approximately two years. Keyboards traditionally come with 61 non-weighted keys (unlike piano keys). If it is possible to source a keyboard with touch sensitive keys, then this is a recommended option.




Some recommended brands to look out for are Yamaha and Casio.


Keyboards are very portable, easy to store and can be played with headphones.

A stage piano is a good digital piano option that is portable but still has weighted keys.







Real Pianos
